Why My Interest in Facob Wagle

- I first joined the Fellowship of First Fleeters as an Associate when my wife discovered her ancestors, John and Hannah Barrisford had arrived in 1788.
- One of the projects that the Fellowship undertakes is to locate burial places of First Fleeters and to erect a dedication plaque at or near the location.
- I discovered the story of Jacob Nagle in Molly Gillen's book and thought it would be appropriate for a plaque to be located sometime in the future in Canton, Ohio where he had died.
- My sister now lives in Ohio and on one of my visits in 2016, I made a visit to Canton to learn more about him and his burial.


Jacob's Revolution Experience

- Jacob Nagle was born in Reading, Pennsylvania to George & Rebecca Nagle on 13 September, 1761.
- George, Jacob's father, was a German immigrant in 1749 and served with the American Colonial forces from 1755 to 1763 against the French who were also fighting a war with the British in Europe.
- George became a Captain and later a Colonel in the Continental Army during the Independence War from 1776 to 1783.
- At age 15, Jacob joined up with his father in the American War of Independence in 1776 but was sent home by his father due to his age.
- Jacob rejoined the Continental Army in 1777 and became involved in battles at Valley Forge and Brandywine. In 1779, he joined the American Navy on the Saratoga for 2 years and 8 months.

Jacob's Service in the Royal Navy

- Jacob signed on to Privateers in the last year of the Revolution in 1782. Privateers were ships that private companies hired to capture British cargo ships to resell goods in America.
- While serving on a Privateer ship he was captured by the Royal Navy in 1782 and then officially signed on with the Royal Navy until April 1783 when the Revolution in America had ended. He was then discharged at Portsmouth, England with pay.
- In September 1783, he again signed on to HMS Ganges and remained with the ship for almost 4 years which took him to Gibraltar several times. Jacob writes that these years were a mixture of boredom and harsh treatment.
- In March 1787, along with several others of the Ganges crew he applied and was transferred to HMS Sirius leaving in May as part of the First Fleet.
- He retired from the Royal Navy in 1802, hoping to return to America with his English wife and two children.

Jacob in Ohio

- Jacob's wife and children died in 1802 during an epidemic in Portugal while waiting for transport to America. He then signed on to various merchant ships that took him to many ports in South America and Asia.
- His merchant service lasted until 1824 when he returned to America aged 63.
- He decided to move to the growing town of Canton in Ohio where his youngest sister and her husband lived. In Canton, he worked as a surveyor and helped develop the nearby town of Massillon.
- During his time in Ohio, he tried at various times to apply for a Revolution War pension and where his diary was important as proof of his service.
- Jacob is officially listed among those granted a pension, although modest in 1832 and listed in official pension lists
- His sister, Sarah Webb died in early 1841 and a month later he also died there.

- Project of placing FFF Plaques on or near known graves of First Fleeters
- Efforts at recognising Jacob Nagle in Canton
- Contacts made in Ohio at Library and Canton City Government
- To date the project has stalled (2021)
- Perhaps a plaque may eventually be placed in McKinley Park where the Plum Street Cemetery was located in the future




